Forestry and Wood Industry in Europe



Forests are the basis for the wood value added chain in Europe

However, the importance of the forestry and wood industry for creating value added, purchasing power, and employment is vastly underestimated.

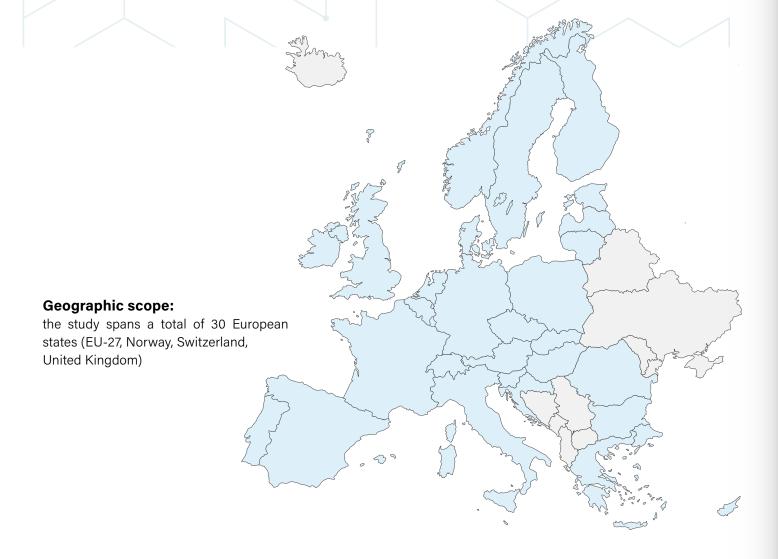
This is because the entire extensive wood value network that extends from raw materials to processed, higher-grade, and high-quality intermediate and end products has not been mapped out.

The forestry and wood industry is cross-sectoral, which means its economic contribution to the national economy is spread across many different sectors. Many smaller elements concealed in less overt economic activities are often not accounted for and their economic contribution is significantly underestimated.

Study: together with the Cooperation Platform Forest-Wood-Paper (FHP), the Federal Ministry of Agriculture, Forestry, Regions and Water Management commissioned the first study on the significance of the forestry and wood industry throughout Europe. The effects of the forestry and wood industry on value creation and employment were investigated by means of collaboration at a European level.

Methodology: creating a *forestry and wood satellite* account made it possible to report and quantify all wood-related sectors of the economy in a form that is consistent with the National Accounts.

Data pool: the calculations are based on data from the reference year 2019.

Forestry and wood industry in the broader sense:

Gross value added

As a National Accounts indicator, this is defined as the total value of goods and services produced in the manufacturing process (gross production value) minus the value of goods and services consumed, processed, or transformed in the manufacturing process (intermediate goods). In other words, the gross value added measures the amount that is available for remunerating the production factors labour (wages and salaries) and capital (profit, interest on borrowed capital, and depreciation).

Indirect effects

These emerge from intermediate goods ties of the company in question to other sectors of the upstream value chain (e.g., by purchasing raw materials, auxiliary materials and fuels, electricity, etc.—this stimulates final demand in these sectors, which in turn require intermediate goods, etc.).

Induced effects

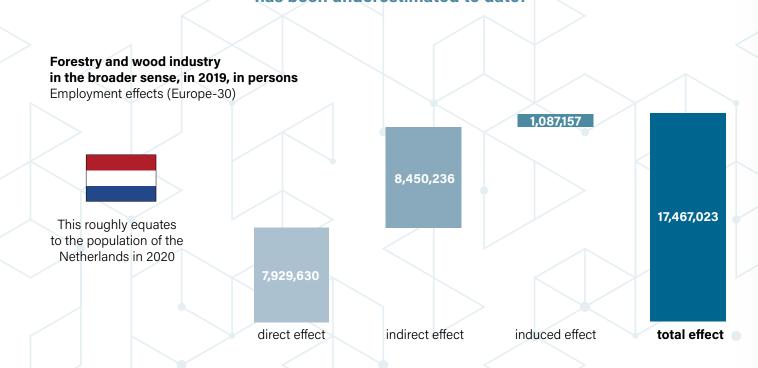
The jobs created or secured as a result of direct and indirect effects generate income, which is subsequently re-spent by the employees (mainly for the purposes of consumption). This stimulates final demand in the relevant sectors (especially in retail). The entrepreneur's profit is also reinvested, which leads to further economic impetus.

Total effects

Calculated as the sum of direct, indirect, and induced effects.

The overall economic importance of the forestry and wood industry has been underestimated to date!

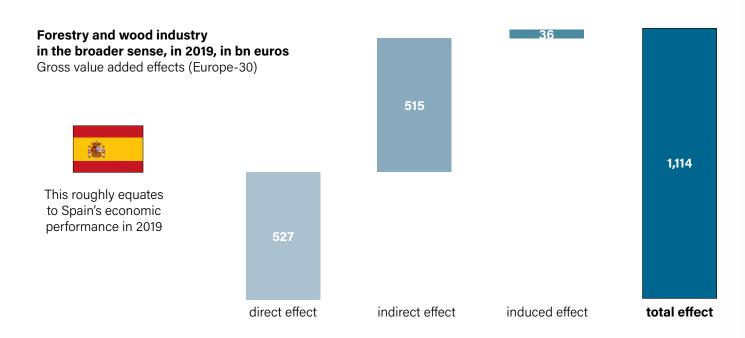

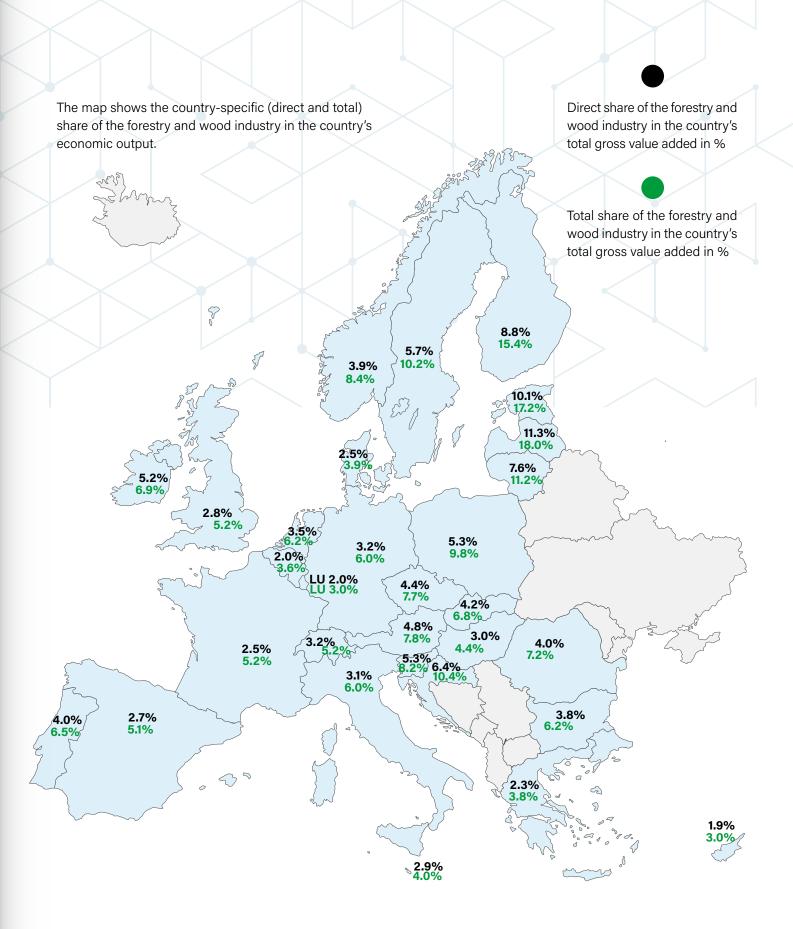

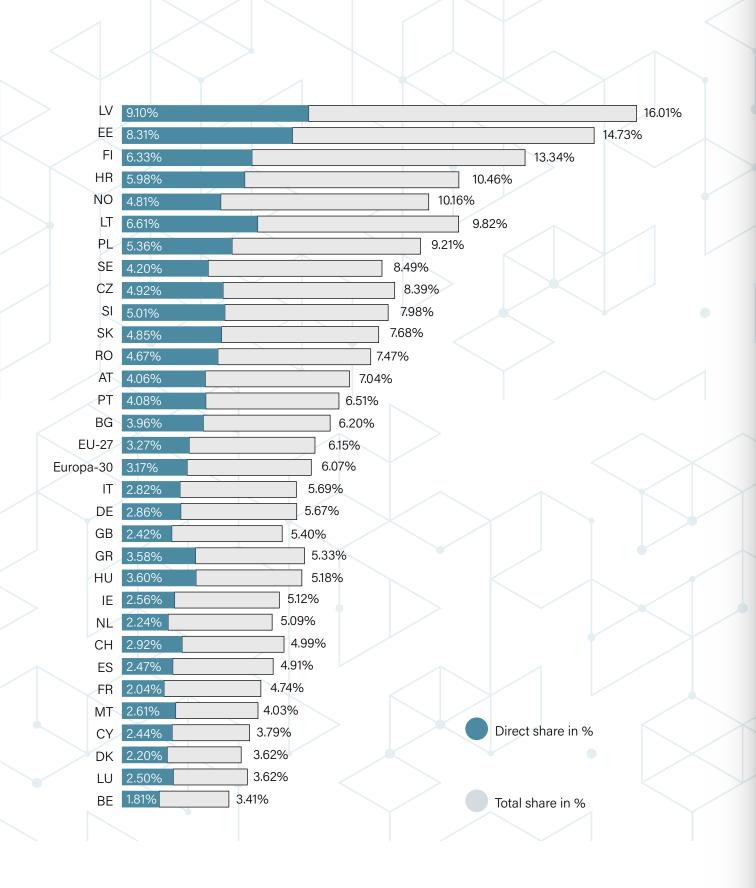

Negative economic consequences due to a reduction in the availability of wood!

Disallowing the use of forest areas by means of political measures, for example, would have serious consequences for Europe's economic output and its labour market.

Reducing logging by a mere 1% would result in a loss of 10.3 billion euros in gross value added as well as around 162,000 jobs.

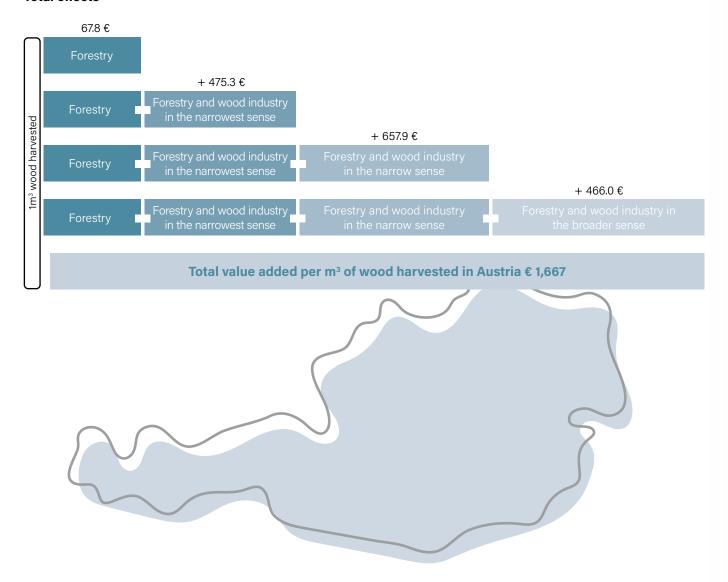
Each cubic metre harvested counts

1 cubic metre of wood harvested in Austria

= up to 1,667 euros of gross value added for the local economy

An illustration of the value added per cubic metre of wood harvested in Austria at each stage of the value chain demonstrates the importance of considering the overall economic impact throughout the entire value chain. The increasing intensity of value added in the downstream stages of the value chain means that from around 67.8 euros of value creation in forestry per cubic metre of harvested wood, up to 1,667 euros can be generated throughout the entire value chain.

Total effects





The forestry and wood sector is one of the most important economic sectors in Austria. The Cooperation Platform Forest-Wood-Paper (FHP) is the glue that keeps the entire sector together.
